How it all started? It started with Rs50.Yes! Along with six friends Rippan Kapur started CRY in 1979 with just Rs. 50. The desire to say "Whatever I can do, I will do" is what defines CRY. For 4 decades CRY has helped over 3 million children and made its impact on 19 states. CRY works at the grassroot level i.e with the parents, teachers, district and state level governments and with the children as well. CRY mainly concentrate on:- a) Education b) health & nutrition c) safety & protection and d) child participation.

So why children? We all know that the children are the future of our nation. So CRY believes that if we take care of our children today, they will take care of our nation tomorrow.

Indian children face some of the worst circumstances of the world (child labour, child marriage, deaths, lack of immunity, crimes). 40% of total children in the world



AZIM PREMJI


These words of wisdom came from one of the richest and kindest businessmen in the world. As of June 2021, his total value is the US \$ 32.9 billion. He lives by the belief he expressed in the quote above, having signed the Noble Giving Pledge in 2013 in which he pledged to donate part of his fortune. He is the first Indian and the third non-American to join the club. Needless to say, in the world of helping other people, Azim Premji is a trailblazer.





zim Hasham Premji was born on July 24, 1945, in Mumbai (then Bombay), two years before India was declared an independent nation, he hails from a Gujarati Muslim family. In the same year his father Mohamed Hashim Premji started a small vanaspati business. It was called Western Indian Vegetable Products Ltd. Little did he know when he started his business that his son would split into one of the world's leading software companies.

Azim Premji prefered to live in India rather than in Pakistan after the 1947 split. Azim Premji went on to study engineering at Stanford University in the US but had to return before graduation because due to poor health condition His father passed away unexpectedly. Azim took responsibility for his family's business on his young shoulders and focused his attention on working outgrowth. From hydrogenated vegetable oils, he began to vary into soap, shoes and lighting lamps, and eventually computers.






After successfully building his company and becoming a world leader, Azim Premji felt the need to contribute to society and face the development challenges facing his country. In 2001 he founded the non-profit organization Azim Premji Foundation.

Dileep Ranjekar helped him establish the foundation. The non-profit organization started primarily with the aim of quality education in rural India. The Foundation works with more than 3,50,000 schools.



Azim Premji, best known for his charitable work, has received Rs. 18,000 crore in dividends and profits over the past five years. The figure has been rising since 2019 when he committed that economic gains from 67 percent of Wipro shares, on shares, sales of shares, etc., would go to his endowment.

The Azim Premji Trust and the Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives, its two philanthropic arms, are divided as part of a group of activists. These corporations own 10.2 percent and 0.27 percent of the company respectively.

For the financial year ended 2017, 2018, 2020, and 2021, philanthropic arms received Rs 1,964 crore, Rs. 5,894 crore, Rs. 1,318 crore, and Rs. 8,156 crore

as stated in the report-India. These funds come from purchases in those years. In fact, by 2020, about 86 percent of the Rs 9,500-crore reimbursement goes directly to the two arms of philanthropic aid. Most of the shares included in this application are likely to come from these instruments as shares have dropped from 13.6 percent to 10.5 percent between FY20 and FY21.

The Azim Premji Foundation was established in the year 2000 to facilitate the use of primary education worldwide. Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives was established in 2014 and aims to provide financial assistance through grants to non-profit organizations working with disadvantaged and disadvantaged people. The base has more than 1,000 employees and field facilities in more than 40 districts.



urshidabad was under the rule of the Nawabs of Bengal who patronized the art of ivory and wood carving. These craftsmen were considered to be the best carvers and their products were often exported.

Murshidabad not only holds a long history in its heritage but also acts as a producer of exquisite handicrafts- Shola (Indian Cork), Kansa (Bell metal craft), ivory and wood carving are one of the leading producers of handicrafts.



Utensils made of Kansa and brass were mass-produced in Behrampore, Khagra, Kandi, Baranagar, and Jangipur in large quantities. This kitchenware is in high demand in the local market and is frequently exported to foreign markets. Due to difficulties in obtaining raw materials and a shift in customer demand towards ceramic and stainless-steel items, this industry is in decline.

In the Murshidabad district, Shola crafts were quite popular. Flower designs, garlands, gorgeous and decorative headdresses, God and goddess sculptures, peacock boats, elephant howdahs, and palanquins are just a few of the wonderful Sholapith crafts manufactured in Murshidabad. Malakar, which means "garland maker," was given to Sholapith craftsmen because they used to produce garlands for idols and royalty.



• IVORY AND WOOD: The Ivory and Wood Handicrafts Industry employs a large portion of Murshidabad's populace. The origins of this technique can be traced back to the time when, Nawabs favoured ivory and wood carving.





Murshidabad is now struggling and has been on the decline for several decades. We feel that increasing public awareness of these unique crafts will improve its current situation.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- To obtain easy loans from local and national banks.
- Establishment of training centers in rural areas.
- Craftsmen must be shaped from traditional approaches to handle the material and create innovative products.
- The local government should implement an effective marketing system.
- The local government should establish a link with a nearby Textile Technology College for technological assistance advancement of the craft.
- To tap the international market and connect to it, a common facility centre must be developed.

INITIATIVES TO REVIVE MURSHIDABAD'S CRAFT AND CULTURE

• Rural Craft Hub (RCH): This project, which was launched in 2013–14 in collaboration with UNESCO, covers ten crafts: Patachitra, Madurkati, Dokra, Terracotta, Chou Masks, Kantha, Wooden dolls, Clay dolls, Wooden Masks, and Sital Pati. Starting with 3,000 artisans, the Project has grown to include 25,000 artisans, incorporating more art forms and state folk traditions.



- SYNERGY and Digital Synergy: Synergy MSME is a one-of-a-kind event which bring together services for MSME entrepreneurs to address their grievances at their doorstep under one roof.
- Finance Clinic (FC): Another one-of-a-kind initiative of the Department to assist MSMEs with funding issues. It serves as a bridge among banks, governments, and entrepreneurs in order to address the financial concerns of existing and prospective entrepreneurs.
- TexPro This project was launched in 2016 to offer private entities an opportunity to establish Textile Parks focusing on all back-end and front-end work: spinning, dying, processing, and garmenting, with active government support.
- A special project called 'Project Muslin' aims to revitalise the finest cotton fabric 'Muslin.' The project's goal is to promote muslin products by working with 3000 weavers in Murshidabad.

Buyers and customers should interact directly. It is also beneficial to be aware of various government schemes on handicrafts. There is a need for the restoration of this heritage home, which had been abandoned for decades. Devoting close attention would ensure that these exquisite crafts last another century or more.
